Grace and peace to you from God our Father and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

At Wednesday School this week — and again next week — we are learning about **Daniel and the Lions' Den.**

To start the lesson, I asked the kids to imagine the *scariest situation* they could think of — something that would make their stomach drop.

They had great answers: a plane crashing, a cruise ship sinking, getting lost in the woods, a bear attack — you name it. We listed twelve on the board and ranked them from least scary to most terrifying.

Then I asked, "Would it be more scary or less scary to face these things alone?"

They all said the same thing: "It's less scary if someone's with you."

That led perfectly into Daniel's story. Daniel was thrown into the lions' den for doing what was right — for praying to God even when the king said not to. It was terrifying. But Daniel wasn't alone. God was with him — his refuge and strength, even among lions.

That's exactly what **Psalm 46** proclaims — not a life without fear, but faith that stands with God in the middle of fear:

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth be moved."

And that's why we began worship with *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*. Luther wrote that hymn when his world was shaking. Like Daniel, he trusted that even when everything else gives way, God's Word still holds firm.

God Is Our Refuge

Psalm 46 paints the picture: mountains trembling, oceans roaring, nations raging. Chaos everywhere — and yet the psalmist dares to say, "We will not fear."

We all have our own lions' dens — a diagnosis, a loss, a strained relationship, a season of uncertainty.

A Moment of Refuge

Have you ever had one of those nights when you wake up at 3 a.m. and your mind just won't stop? You replay every worry, every what-if. The house is silent, but inside, everything's loud. I've been there. And what finally quiets the noise isn't a perfect plan or a sudden solution — it's remembering that I'm not facing any of it alone. God's there in the dark, steady and calm, holding the world until morning.

That's what Psalm 46 promises. Refuge isn't the absence of trouble; it's the presence of God *in* trouble — the same presence Daniel felt in the lions' den.

And if you stood outside here in Medora last Monday, you know what a windy day feels like. The air howled through the valley, sand whipped across the road, and the cottonwoods bent low. That's what life feels like sometimes — like everything's shifting. But Psalm 46 says, "God is in the midst of the city; it shall not be moved." Even when the wind picks up, God holds the ground steady beneath us.

God's Word Sets Us Free

In John's Gospel, Jesus adds to that promise:

"If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

The people listening didn't understand. "Free? We've never been slaves!" But Jesus wasn't talking about physical chains — he meant the things that bind our hearts: guilt, fear, shame, the need to be enough.

That's what Martin Luther discovered. He spent years trying to earn God's favor. The harder he tried, the heavier the burden became. Then one day, reading Scripture, he realized: it's not about what we do — it's about what Christ has already done.

That truth set him free, and it still frees us today. The truth of God's Word doesn't just forgive us — it releases us. It breaks open every cage that fear and sin try to build around us.

God's Word Still Reforms

Psalm 46 says, "God speaks, and the earth melts away." God's Word doesn't just comfort; it transforms. That's what the Reformation was — God speaking new life into a weary church.

And God hasn't stopped reforming us. The same Word that strength-

ened Daniel and Luther still reforms hearts today. Every generation faces the same question: what does it mean to continue in God's Word *now*?

Maybe it means rediscovering kindness in a world that's forgotten how to listen.

Maybe it means opening our doors wider — not just saying "all are welcome," but meaning it.

Maybe it means remembering that God's power isn't in noise or control, but in quiet strength.

And maybe it means remembering the faith of our children — the kind of faith we heard in Wednesday School and in the children's sermon this morning. The simple truth that "God helps us in trouble" isn't just a message for kids. It's the foundation for every one of us.

Refuge and Freedom Today

Psalm 46 and John 8 belong together. One speaks of refuge; the other, of freedom. Together, they tell us who we are and whose we are.

When everything shakes, God is our stronghold.

When sin binds us, Christ sets us free.

When the world feels uncertain, God's Word endures.

The truth that reformed the church 500 years ago still reforms us today. We live not by fear or performance, but by grace — and that grace gives us both safety and courage, refuge and freedom, to love boldly in a shaking world.





A Mighty Fortress and a Living Faith

Luther's *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God* was written under threat, yet he could still sing, "The Word they still shall let remain." That's the heartbeat of Reformation Sunday — God's Word still remains.

But that truth isn't meant to stay in a hymn or in history books — it's meant to take root in us.

So here's the call:

Stand firm in God's Word when the world feels uncertain.

Be refuge for someone else when life feels like a lions' den.

Live the freedom Christ gives — not by fear, but by grace.

Because when the wind picks up, when fear creeps in, and when everything seems to shift — the world needs to see the church standing on something solid.

And that solid ground is Christ — our refuge, our strength, our freedom.

Amen.
