From the Pastor

Death...and Resurrection

One of my favorite things about spring are the signs of new life around us! Calves are born, new grass begins to grow, trees and flowers begin to blossom, the birds are singing more vigorously, and the days begin to grow longer

In our Lenten season this year, these 40 days before Easter, we are spending time in midweek worship with the theme "Continuing in the Covenant of Baptism". The focus for each midweek worship service is a portion of the promises made in baptism. How do we live out our baptismal promises: 1) to live among God's faithful people; 2) to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper; 3) to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed; 4) to serve all people, following the example of Jesus; and 5) to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

Isaiah reminds us our thoughts are not God's thoughts, nor are our ways God's ways. (Isaiah 55:8-9) In order to live out these baptismal promises, we are completely dependent on God. We admit that we have sinned, we receive forgiveness in the washing away of our sins and we ask God to help us change.

What did you say? Change?? NO way! I am comfortable with the way things are. Why do we have to change all the time? By definition, change requires something to be made different. When something is no longer what it once was, something has gone away (died) in order for something new to emerge (resurrection). Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 5:17 "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (NRSV)

Martin Luther writes in the Small Catechism, in response to the significance of baptism, "It (baptism) signifies that the old person in us with all sins and evil desires is to be drowned and die through daily sorrow for sin and through repentance, and on the other hand that daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever."

What needs to change/die in us, in order for new life to emerge? As we move from the season of Lent into the season of Easter, let us identify the places where we need to change both individually and as a community of faith. We can expect to see new life, because God promises resurrection!

Fall Prevention

Have you or a loved one experienced a fall? Falls can be devastating for some individuals but are preventable! Environmental factors can easily be changed to help reduce your or a loved one's risk of falling.

1. High contrast colors. Including high contrast colors where surfaces change will make seeing and moving around in your home easier. Examples include contrasting colors from floor to wall, hardwood floor to carpet, where steps or a ramp begins/ends, rug to floor, floor to furniture or other tripping hazards such as cords or ledges.

2. Non-slip treads. Place non-slip stickers, mats or treads anywhere the floor can become slippery. Recommendations include: shower floor, right where you step outside of the shower, around the toilet, indoor/outdoor stairs, ledges or any surface that is slippery by nature such as hardwood floor.

3. Clothing. Choose comfortable clothing that fits well, not too loose or too restrictive. If your pants are too long, get them hemmed. Wear good fitting shoes preferably with grips on the bottom and avoid shoes without a back. Ill-fitting clothing and shoes can easily present as a tripping hazard if pieces are not secure or become too baggy.

This a quick, general list that does not include details specific to individuals. If you are fearful of falling or have more concerns, please reach out to your primary care doctor or a trusted healthcare provider for more guidance. Brothers and sisters in Christ,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Savior Jesus!

I pray that your Lenten journey has been a blessed and holy time. The Lenten season was different for many of us once again this year. War. Division. Hatred. Violence. Anger. It's all just so much. It's all so heavy.

Our Synod Council recently adopted a "why statement" for our work together as synod. Think of this as our new mission or purpose statement. Our why statement emerged after more than 12 months of conversation and prayer around the mission and ministry God is calling our synod into. I believe it also speaks to the truth that we don't do any of this work alone. That's important for us to hear and be reminded of from time to time, because sometimes everything can feel a bit overwhelming.

I invite you to join me in giving God thanks and praise for the prayer-filled, Spirit-led work that has been done by our Synod Council. We continue to seek the Spirit's guidance as we live out this mission and ministry together.

<u>To</u> encourage and equip the ministries of the Western North Dakota Synod – ELCA, <u>so that</u> the Good News of Jesus Christ is proclaimed, and all God's children feel welcomed and included in the ministries to which God calls us.

Over the next several months we will continue to see our Synod's mission and ministry unfolding as we seek to encourage and equip one another in this work. Just a few examples of how this will happen include:

- the 2022 Synod Assembly at the Grand Hotel in Minot (June 3-5) www.wndsynod.org/synod-assembly.

I look forward to seeing you at one, or all of, these synod events as we together we share in the proclamation of the good news of Jesus across our synod and around the world!

As our Lenten journey comes to an end, may our joyous pronouncements of "He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!" ring out across our synod. And may our work together as synod bear witness to Mary Magdalene's joy after she has witnessed the resurrection firsthand – "I have seen the Lord!!" May it be so.
